How Rastafari Moved the World

Rastafari cultural symbols are recognizable throughout the world. We see its sounds and symbols represented in so many ways, although we rarely have a good understanding of what they mean beyond the One Love ideology that it expresses. We know its music, language, and often identify with its social and political movement—but why? In this talk, I'll walk us though how a small and isolated community within Jamaica honed in on the anxiety of Black diasporic populations creating a religious and cultural practice that would inspire generations throughout the world

Professor Osiapem focuses on language variation and identity in the African Diaspora, particularly the Caribbean. She is collaborating on "The Linguistic Atlas of the Greater Caribbean," gathering linguistic data across Caribbean nations in a longitudinal study. Previously a Post Doctoral Fellow at Washington University in St. Louis, she earned her PhD at UGA. Osiapem leads Study Away programs in the Caribbean and has taken students to Barbados and the Virgin Islands. Her achievements include being the inaugural Richard Bland Faculty Fellow and director of the Africana House. Since 2007, she has combined her interests in Africana Studies and Linguistics at William & Mary, addressing race and representation in her courses.
